

# BEYOND EDUCATION

BSF has several different funds to support our students and their families beyond their education. One such fund is the Marylee Bottom of the Heart Fund. Marylee Donovan joined the BSF Board in 2001 and, before her death, constantly contributed not only to the "business" of BSF but the "heart" as well. This Fund is maintained for support in emergencies to include unique medical problems.

There are also the Jorge Imana Fund for the Arts, which has paid for musical instruments, endless folkloric classes, etc., and the Ken Kesson English Fund which has paid for many Cambridge English classes.

#### **A Current Situation**

We are currently experiencing a unique medical situation with our long time student Cesar.

Nearly four years ago Cesar was diagnosed with Multiple Sclerosis. The family "pretended" that things were under control and Cesar actually started his University education as planned. Unfortunately, the family's lack of funds of any kind meant no medicine was available, and, in fact, the local hospital told him that the only treatment available cost \$50,000 so to go home and do the best he could. The family tried eating better...not easy when money is so tight, and Cesar soon found he could no longer negotiate getting around campus as his disease was rapidly progressing. Throughout his schooling, Cesar has been an outstanding student and throughout this ordeal, his spirit and kindness is not new to those that know him. Unfortunately Cesar had to put his goal of becoming a mechanical engineer on hold. His dream in the future is to continue to pursue this goal.

About a month ago, one of our angelic Directors, who did not really know Cesar well, had occasion to sit with Cesar and his Mother when BSF was distributing some emergency funds. The Mother finally admitted that they desperately needed help, repeated the hospital's "recommendations" and shed some tears with several people in attendance that day.

The Angel decided to personally take on Cesar's situation and was determined to see what could be done. She paid for several consultations with neurologists in Ensenada and Tijuana, subsidized MRIs and various lab costs. It was finally determined the best possible approach would be through Stem Cell Treatment. The physicians doing this were carefully vetted and all had amazing reviews. And, frankly, it was the first real hope we had to help Cesar. And, it cost just over \$20,000, with many donated services included.

Thanks to the continued angelic support and extremely generous donations from several BSF supporters, Cesar started stem cell treatments on September 2nd and has experienced miraculously fast results.



September 3rd status report from one of his Doctors: .... "it's amazing how the cells are taking to his body so fast. He hasn't been able to walk on his own in two years and guess what? He's actually walking on his own! Great progress and much more therapy to go, but all headed in the right direction. The patient is totally happy and his mom as well. We will continue physical therapy post procedure so he can learn to balance, and walk properly. Bottom line, it's all amazing!"

The situation doesn't end there. Because of Cesar's impaired coordination, BSF is also looking at how to facilitate easier access to his home, which is situated on a rugged terrain with very steep steps to get to and from his house, as well as household appliances to make his and his family's life easier.
